

Armirantes Archipelago

The Amirantes archipelago lies south-west of the extensive, shallow-water Seychelles Bank in the western Indian Ocean and comprises of a group of carbonate island and islets extending over a distance of approximately 152km, from 4°52'S, African Banks, to 6°14'S, Desnoeufs Atoll. Most of the islands are sea-level coral reef platforms with varying degrees of subaerial sand cay and coral island development.

The Amirantes Bank is an elongate structure, measuring approximately 180km by 35km, deepest in its central zone with a marginal rim at water depths of 11 - 27m.95km further south are the atolls of Alphonse, Bijoutier and St Francois. Desroches Island lies 16km east of the Amirantes Bank.

Amirantes Islands

Quo Vadis liveaboard trips are unique in the fact that anglers have the opportunity to fish up to six areas during the charter. Poivre, Sand Cay, African Banks and Remire Atolls are blessed with its wide array of thriving and unexploited marine life making them one of the "must do" fishing destinations.

It's a diverse place offering great offshore fishing for various pelagic and resident species as well as spectacular on shore flats fly fishing for bonefish and permit. However, beyond the diverse offering of fishing adventures to choose from, what makes the Amirantes one of the most desirable fishing destinations is its remote nature; the islands are largely undeveloped, allowing anglers to explore the untouched beauty these atolls have to offer.

Africa Banks

African Banks lies about 230km west of Mahé and the nearest island is Rémire lying 27km south. The group is a pseudo Atoll and has two small islands, which appear as small sandstone ridges exposed only at low tide. The underwater bank extends four kilometeres north to south, three kilometers east to west and occupy's a total area of about 10 square kilometers. The shallow coral ring is incomplete with the western edge varying between 19 to 36 meters deep.

Rémire Island (Eagle Island)

Situated 245km south of Mahé, Rémire is a tiny island only measuring 300 square meters. It is about halfway between African Banks, which is 25km north, and D'Arros Island 31.5km to the south. 2.5km west of Remire lies the southern edge of Remire Reef, which is detached and makes for a great fishing area.

Poivre Atoll

Poivre lies 268km south of Mahé and is situated on the eastern edge of Amirante Bank. It's a small atoll, which is made up of two islands, Poivre and Ile du Sud, occupying the cardinal points of the compass. These islands are separated by a shallow lagoon which extends all the way back into ile du Sud on a high tide. This area has the best of both worlds with mind blowing flats that will excite any fly fishing enthusiast, and arguably the best game fishing area that the Amirantes Atoll's have to offer. Situated on the eastern edge of the Amirante Trench which steadily steps down to 1200 meters only a few kilometers from shore, the area is synonymous for its great bluewater fishing. One of these renowned areas is the appropriately named "kennels" that is home to record breaking dog tooth tuna. Poivre is known as the best indo pacific permit fishery in the Seychelles.

Amirantes Fishing

Flats fly fishing

Catching a permit on fly is an experience that every saltwater fly angler aspires to achieve. The broken coral and turtle grass flats surrounding Poivre, Remire and African Banks are the perfect habitat for these graceful feeders. Poivre is known as the atoll with the most prolific populations of Indo-Pacific permit in the Seychelles. On certain tides, there are also good numbers of bonefish in the four to eight pound range, which feed on the edge of the atoll. Poivre is purely a wading destination and anglers get to stalk these finicky feeders on foot as they hypnotize anglers with the waving of their sickle tails.

Bluewater Fishing

The Amirantes has some of the greatest offshore angling that the Seychelles waters has to offer, and the beauty is that all the spots are easily accessible by Quo Vadis. The offshore structure is ideal, with a mixture of rings of sunken coral atolls, sheer drop offs, ridges and ledges, all of which are teeming with game fish. Anglers enjoy exploring the edges of the famous "Ledge", the "Amirantes Trench", "Sand Cay Banks" as well as the other rims and coral reef platforms, while targeting the diversity of species both pelagic and reef that can be caught. Fish like sailfish, wahoo, dogtooth tuna, yellowfin tuna, dorado, giant trevally, bluefin trevally, jobfish, tropical amberjack and a large variety of snapper, wrasse and grouper can be caught on any given day.

If you have never fought a sailfish, wahoo or yellowfin tuna, to name a few, on the fly, you are at the right place! The deep blue depths provide a prolific feeding ground for various fish species as the constant flow of rich currents well-up against the drop offs, ledges and ridges of the Amirantes. Anglers can start fishing for sailfish a mere 10 minutes away from Desroches as the fishing grounds are a mere two miles from Quo Vadis's mooring. The pelagics are often lured to the boat by trawling a spread of teasers. Once they are within casting range, the hook-less teasers are removed and the angler casts a fly. The reef species can be targeted by dredging with a heavy sink tip fly line and a Mega Clouser. There is also the option of targeting both pelagic and reef species that congregate around the shoals of baitfish, such as fusiliers and scads.

Skiffs and Guides

All fly fishing trips on Quo Vadis are accompanied by two purpose built flats skiffs that are equipped with polling platforms and poles, and will be skippered by three experienced and professional Alphonse Fishing Co. guides. Angling teams will be split up into groups of two anglers per skiff and guide.

Seasons

The main fishing season runs from early October to the end of May

Wading

The hard white sand, turtlegrass or coral flats of the Seychelles make for easy wading, separating it from other destinations in the world. As most of the fishing will be done whilst wading, good protective footwear is essential. Standard diver's neoprene booties with a reinforced rubber sole are not appropriate. A more protective flats wading boots must be worn. There are a number of purpose made boots on the market, which are excellent. See suggested brands in tackle and gear check list at the end of this document.

Seychelles Species

BoneFish (Albula vulpes)

Poivre has a small population of bonefish that frequent the flats in the 4 to 6lbs rage with the odd fish reaching 8lbs. On falling tides bonefish can be found in small schools on the outer edge of the flat.

Moustache Triggerfish (Balistoides viridescens)

A colourful and energetic feeder that tails when feeding in the shallows, both up on the flats and on the reef edges. Known as a giant, titan or moustache triggerfish, it is the largest of the two species that can be caught at Poivre. There is a small population of moustache triggerfish that can be targeted at times on the outer reef on a low tide.

Seychelles Species

Indo-Pacific Permit (Trachinotus blochii)

Poivre has the healthiest populations of permit in the Indian Ocean and tends to have these fish spread out over the entire fishery. The Alphonse Fishing Guides have near-perfected the art of catching these fish, considered the Holy Grail of saltwater flyfishing! If permit are on your bucket list, then this is definitely the destination for you.

Yellowmargin Triggerfish (Pseudobalistes flavimarginatus)

Triggerfish are opportunists, feeding mainly on small crustaceans, which makes them perfect targets on a fly. Poivre has a small population of yellowmargin triggerfish that can be targeted at times on the outer reef on a low tide.

Giant Trevally (Caranx ignobilis)

Poivre has less GT's than that of Alphonse, Astove and Cosmoledo as they tends to spend the majority of their time offshore. This atoll however does have some larger specimens, with average catch stats of approximately I per angler per week when fishing for permit and possibly more if strategically targeted on spring tides.

Bluefin Trevally (Caranx melampygus)

Bluefin trevally are distributed throughout the tropical waters of the world with populations varying according to fishing pressure. Areas like Poivre, that have shallow lagoons, support healthy populations of juveniles, which contribute immensely to the overall population. The typical size of fish would be from 18 cm to 80 cm, with an 80 cm specimen being a trophy.

Indo - Pacific Sailfish (Istiophorus platypterus)

The sailfish is the fastest fish in the sea and named after its large dorsal fin, which extends most of the length of its body. These acrobatic fighters are found in good numbers offshore of the Amirante Islands.

Dogtooth Tuna (Gymnosarda unicolor)

Dogtooth tuna are a resident-pelagic fish that are found along the drop-offs in good numbers in the Amirantes. They patrol continental shelf drop-offs and frequent depths between 50 and 150 ft, which are found relatively close to shore around the atoll. These fish can be targeted by dredging with a heavy sink tip fly line and a Mega Clouser.

Seychelles Species

Barracuda (Sphyraena barracuda)

These fearsome looking creatures are extremely fast and jump when hooked. Larger barracuda, which grow to over 240 cm, are more or less solitary in their habits and hunt alone when on the flats. Although all of our destinations have decent numbers of barracuda, fewer specimens are caught in the Amirantes.

Wahoo (Acanthocybium solandri)

The Seychelles waters are known for their incredible numbers of wahoo due to the rich currents that flow close to the atolls. Reaching speeds of up to 80 kilometres per hour, the wahoo is the third fastest fish in the sea. Wahoo are frequently caught when actively targeting them offshore of the Amirantes Islands.

Yellowfin Tuna (Thunnus albacares)

Yellowfin Tuna migrate through out the Seychelles year-round following bait and particular ocean currents. As a result the tuna caught around the Amirantes fluctuates, with the majority of catches being seen at the start and end of the season. When actively targeted offshore yellowfin tuna can be caught in good numbers surrounding the Amirantes Islands.

Tackle & Gear Checklist

Rod and Reel Loan

Fly fishing outfits consisting of Thomas and Thomas fly rods and Shilton reels, loaded with 300 yards of Cortland braided backing can be loaned at no charge. It's important that angler's pre book the rod hire to insure that we have sufficient stock. Anglers can either purchase fly lines in the shop or bring fly lines from home to accompany their respective hire rods. All rod breakages are for your account and will be billed at US\$150 per rod.

Tackle and Gear

Quo Vadis will have a range of fly lines, flies and various other items for sale should you run out. Any tackle that is needed can be pre-ordered and will be delivered to the lodge for your arrival. All tackle sales may be settled at the end of your trip upon check out.

Recommended Permit, Bonefish, Triggerfish & Milkfish Outfit

- 2 x 9-foot 9# or 10# weight fly rod (1 x Spare)
- 1 x High quality large arbor saltwater series reel, with a strong smooth drag to match the weight of the fly rod. Load the reel with two to three hundred yards of 50lbs braid.
- 1 x High quality weight forward tropical floating line, suitable for warm water conditions.

- 2 x 9-foot 12-weight fly rod (1 x Spare)



Amirantes Experiences Fishing

Snorkeling

The snorkelling around the pirouetting coral heads and walls of the Amirates is simply out of this world. There are snorkelling outfits on board for your use.

Diving

The Amirantes are known for their clear waters, abundant coral gardens, and diverse species of fish, making them a top destination for both beginners and experienced divers. The surrounding reefs are rich with hard and soft corals and divers can expect to see a variety of reef fish, parrotfish, butterflyfish, moray eels, and groupers. The reefs are also home to rare species like turtles, eagle rays, and manta rays. Reef sharks are commonly seen patrolling the area. One of the key appeals of diving in the Amirantes is the seclusion. Unlike more popular dive spots, the Amirantes offer a sense of exclusivity, where dive sites are rarely crowded, allowing divers to explore the reefs undisturbed.

Stand-Up Paddle Boarding

The lagoons and sheltered areas around the Amirantes are ideal for stand-up paddleboarding. The calm, flat waters make it easy for both beginners and experienced paddlers to navigate while enjoying the surrounding beauty. It's common to spot green sea turtles, dolphins, stingrays, and even small reef sharks while paddleboarding. The shallow waters near the coral reefs allow you to get a close look at fish and other underwater species.

St. Joseph Atoll is particularly known for its shallow waters, making it a perfect destination for stand-up paddleboarding. Paddling through the turquoise waters of the atoll offers breathtaking views of mangroves, seabirds, and marine life like turtles and rays gliding beneath your board.

Kayaking

The kayaking along the edge of the islands on a high tides gives guests the opportunity to see the magnificent bounty of turtles, rays, fish, and various other sea creatures, which call the Amirantes their home. There will be two kayaks onboard which you are welcome to explore with.

Getting there

- Mahé in the Seychelles is a four and a half hour flight from Dubai, Abu Dhabi, and Doha which all serve as a connecting hub for regular international flights from Europe, the United States, Africa and Asia..
- There are direct flights to the Seychelles from Paris, Bombay, Nairobi, Mauritius, Antananarivo, Johannesburg, Addis Ababa, Reunion, Colombo, Dar-Es-Salaam and Frankfurt.
- Guests are required to fly into Mahé at least 4 hours prior to departure.
- The Quo Vadis Motor Yacht, based in Eden Island Marina on Mahé, can also depart from any alternative port of your choice. However, this would be subject to additional domestic flight costs.
- For your convenience, Alphonse scheduled domestic flights can be arranged to divert to Desroches Island, subject to availability. Desroches Island is also accessible via private charter flights.
- Alphonse scheduled flights depart and return to Mahé each Saturday and selected Wednesdays. Flights depart from the Domestic Terminal at the Mahé airport.
- Flight times are subject to change. Please makes sure you confirm your correct domestic flight times with our reservations team.
- Return flights are to be booked the next day after arriving back in Mahé to avoid missing your international flights.

Hours of Daylight

Due to its proximity to the equator, there is no real twilight in the Seychelles. The sun rises quickly at around o6h15, and sets with equal swiftness at about 18h30. This varies by only minutes throughout the year, giving nearly a full 12 hours of daylight for 365 days a year.

Conservation Donation & Environmental Levy

Conservation Donation

There is a mandatory conservation donation of \$30per person, per night. This will be included in your confirmation invoice and is settled prior to arrival or on check out. Donations are complimentary for children o - 17 years. This goes to the Alphonse Foundation and funds the conservation centre on the island and our long-term projects, if you would like to contribute further to our special projects that is welcomed and can be settled on check-out

Environmental Levy

Please take note that the Seychelles Government has introduced a Tourism Environmental Sustainability Levy which will come into effect from the 01 August 2023. Establishments will charge and collect this levy from the visitors upon guests check-out. For more information, please refer to Seychelles Tourism Sustainability Levy. This levy is applicable for all guests over 13 years old.

Accident Medevac Insurance

You are required to obtain "From Scene of Accident Medivac Insurance". Please supply these details prior to arrival. Blue Safari Seychelles and agents cannot assume any financial responsibility for consequences incurred if this has not been obtained.

Indemnities

You are required to sign an indemnity form onsite, this will be provided to you upon arrival.

Passports & Visas - Entry into Seychelles

Passports & Visas

No visa is required for a holiday. - This applies to all foreign passport holders.

Entry Into Seychelles

Every visitor who intends to travel by air or sea to the Seychelles must have an approved, valid Travel Authorization or Disembarkation Information Form. Applications can only be made up to 29 days prior to your arrival date in Seychelles. There are different requirements for travel to the Seychelles for citizens, permit holders and visitors. Please pay attention to the required documents that apply to you and / or your group. A yellow fever vaccination is needed if you are traveling to Seychelles from a yellow fever endemic region. If you are transiting through an airport of a yellow fever endemic region for less than 12 hours you do not need yellow fever vaccination. You will need this vaccination certificate to apply for your Travel Authorisation. Get in touch with our team if you are unsure of which countries fall within the yellow fever endemic region. Please note that all travellers must have a valid credit / debit card available to pay the fee. (€10 per application and you get your clearance within 9 hours).

Before you apply, ensure you have all of your mandatory documents ready:

- Valid passport
- Selfie or passport-type photo
- Contact information
- Details of your arrival flight into Seychelles
- Details of your visit in Seychelles
- Details of accommodation for every night of your stay in Seychelles

- Details of your departure flight from Seychelles
- Travel insurance with medical cover for CV 19
- Yellow Fever Vaccination (if you have visited a yellow fever endemic region prior to arrival in Seychelles)

Flights & Luggage

- Only Applicable if flying Domestically
- Guests are expected to arrive in Mahé the day before their trip as any delay on the day of departure will certainly cause the trip to be missed.
- The domestic flights leave from the domestic terminal at Mahé Airport.
- Please always confirm flight times, as flights are subject to change.
- Check in starts 1 hour before your scheduled departure time and closes 30 minutes prior to take off.
- Please see weight limit restrictions in bold below
- On request, the Alphonse Team in Mahé will assist you with the storage of excess luggage while you are on destination.
- It's as important for return flight to be booked a minimum of 4 hours after arriving back in Mahé as any delays may cause guests to miss their international flights.
- Flights are scheduled for Saturdays and Wednesdays allowing for four, seven, 10 and 14 night stays.
- Alternatively private charters can be arranged to suite any dates required.

Your check in luggage is strictly limited to 15kg (33 pounds) per person, and 5kg (12 pounds) carry-on luggage.

Although a minimal amount of clothing is required when fishing the flats, it is important to follow the recommended list.

- 1 x Rain jacket [must be lightweight]
- 1 x Sungloves
- 1 x Cycling / lycra shorts for wearing under your flats shorts to prevent chafing
- 1 x Flats wading boot, with thick soles and good ankle support [Please refrain from using neoprene booties. They do not offer adequate protection!]
- 1 x Gravel guards
- 1 x Waterproof fly box to prevent your flies from rusting.
- 2 x Polarized sunglasses [Costa Del Mar's 580 amber and green mirror lenses]

- 1 x Sunscreen [SPF 30+]
- 1 x Lip block
- 2 x Buffs
- I x Hat / cap
- 1 x Stripping gloves
- 1 x Waterproof backpack
- 1 x Headlamp or torch
- 1 x Soft tissue for drying & cleaning lenses
- 1 x Pliers for removing hooks and squashing barbs

Health & Safety

Water Consumption

There is a desalination plant at the Camp and the water from the faucets is safe to drink. We do not stock mineral water and will only supply it if you specifically requested prior to your arrival.

Sun Protection Clothing

The climatic conditions in the Seychelles can be harsh for those that aren't accustomed to them. Light weight breathable fabrics are recommended. Sunscreen should ideally be SPF 50 for any exposed skin.

Dangers to Watch Out For Whilst Wading

Stingrays: Some atolls host large numbers of stingrays on the flats. Most species have a venomous, barbed spine near the base of their tails that they can use for defence. These spines can inflict a nasty wound, should an unwary wader inadvertently stand on a stingray. These often sedentary or slow moving fish are easy to see and avoid, and to date no anglers have had any problems with these docile creatures.

Stonefish: Found mainly in the shallows on the coral edges of reef flats, stone-fish are not only lethally toxic but are also very well camouflaged and will not move unless touched. A stonefish has 13 strong hollow spines through which it injects its venom and these will pass through a thin rubber sole with ease. For this reason all wading should be done wearing thick-soled wading boots.

Cone Shells: Fish-eating cones live in crevices among the coral or half covered by sand awaiting their prey which they attack by shooting out a dart that injects a paralysing venom. The venom from certain species can be fatal, how-ever proper footwear will ensure your safety.

Sharks: Frequently encountered whilst wading in Seychelles, sharks are inquisitive and may pause for an instant and give you the once over, but if you remain calm and quietly stand your ground, these magnificent creatures will not bother you. Communication

Tipping is never mandatory. The below serve as a guideline based on average tips given. Tips are to be left at reception upon departure for equal distribution. Any gratuities will be appreciated by the staff and we thank you for your generosity.

Cancellation Policies
